JOHN WOLFE, EARLY SETTLER, IS DEAD

CAME TO EL PASO COUNTY 47 YEARS AGO.

Pioneers Will Act as Pallbearers at Funeral From Residence Tomorrow.

Funeral services will be conducted at the residence, 905 Cheyenne road, tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, over the body of John Wolfe, who died yesterday morning. The pallbearers will be Irving Howbert, Frank Cotten, L. E. Sherman, William Banning, E. W. Roberts and Robert Donnelly, all old friends of the deceased. Interment will be at Evergreen cemetery.

In the death of Mr. Wolfe, Colorado Springs loses one of its earliest settlers. He came to El Paso county nearly 10 years before the town was founded. Coming to Colorado in 1860, Mr. Wolfe located on Cheyenne creek, where for 47 years he made his home. He engaged successfully in ranching, and for the last several years had not been actively in business.

He was 72 years of age, and was born in Harrison county, Ohio, later removing to Iowa. He enlisted in 1864 in company G of the Third Colorado cavalry, and took part in the famous battle of Sand Creek. He was a member of the local post of the G. A. R., and the veterans will probably attend the funeral in a body. Mr. Wolfe was widely known throughout the county as a man of sterling character. He is survived only by a widow.
